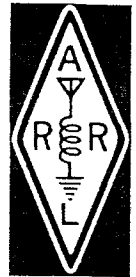

### **MASSACHUSETTS PRB-1 INVOKED TO AXE LOCAL TOWER LAW**

A Massachusetts ham recently made good use of the PRB-1 federal pre-emption that was incorporated into that state's laws a couple of years ago to get a very restrictive local zoning bylaw overturned. Recently, the Massachusetts Attorney General's office disapproved the bylaw--known as Article 43--that had passed at the annual town meeting in Easton, Massachusetts. The bylaw applied limitations on the siting of towers, antennas and satellite dishes that would have restricted them from being built closer than 500 feet from existing buildings and prohibited them entirely from residential lots. The bylaw also would have prohibited antennas or dishes located on a structure from exceeding the structure's height by 10 feet.

Armed with a copy of the Massachusetts tower bill provided by ARRL New England Vice Director Don Haney, KA1T, Joseph Goveia, W1LQB, of North Easton wrote the state's attorney general and enclosed a copy of the state's PRB-1 statute. Under Massachusetts law, the attorney general's office must approve all zoning bylaw amendments.

In response, the attorney general told the Town of Easton that the restrictions in Article 43 "as applied to Amateur Radio antennas, violate state law." The AG declared, "No zoning ordinance or bylaw shall prohibit the construction or use of an antenna structure by a federally licensed Amateur Radio operator." The AG noted that zoning bylaws in Massachusetts "may reasonably regulate the location and height of such antenna structures for the purposes of health, safety, or aesthetics" but the bylaws would still have to "effectively accommodate Amateur Radio communications."

The AG also noted that "it is not at all clear that home satellite dishes for television reception would be permitted under this article."

ARRL New England Director Tom Frenaye, K1KI, observed that the Bay State's tower law "gives Massachusetts Amateur Radio operators a very viable tool to use in ensuring that Amateur Radio

**SEPTEMBER MEETING**

Questions) files



**Can I operate my HT on an airplane if I get the permission of the pilot?**

Technically, maybe. But don't count on it. In general, you can't use a radio or scanner on an airline (or charter) \*unless\* the airline allows it and the pilot-in-command (PIC) determines that it will not interfere with the instruments and radios on that specific aircraft. Very few US airlines allow passengers to use radios so be ready to disconnect the antenna when you ask. (Don't even ask to transmit.)

For reference (in the US) the pertinent portion of the Federal Aviation Regulations (FARs) is Part 91, paragraph 91.21.

Due to airport security, you may have a little difficulty carrying the HT (or any electronic equipment) onto the airplane. Generally, you can appease the security

guards, simply by showing that the unit is operational and doesn't have a bomb inside. For a radio, just turning it on and opening the squelch satisfies them. Expect more difficulty during periods of increased security.

On a private airplane, it is legal to operate an amateur radio if you have the permission of the PIC. It is still possible for the radio to interfere with the plane's navigation or communication equipment, so be sure to ask first. Always obey the requests of the PIC. He knows his airplane and radios better than you do.

**More vanity paperwork**

More paperwork for hams making paper filings to obtain a vanity callsign. As of September 15th, applicants for vanity calls using form 610V will be required to submit a Form 159 as well. Form 159 is the FCC Remittance Form and the agency says that applications received on or after September 15 and lacking a Form 159 will not be processed. They will be returned to the applicant instead.

Previously, the FCC required an Form 159 with a hardcopy Form 610V only if the applicant was paying with a credit card or money order or for a single payment to cover multiple applications.

The change comes with very short notice. The FCC has yet to issue a formal public notice to address it.

None-the-less, the Commission says that the September 15th start-up date is firm.

### Nevada Ham Plates.

Ham radio operators residing in Nevada can make a statement on the states highways not only with personalized license plates, but also with special tags acknowledging such diverse accomplishments as graduating from a Nevada university, winning big at a Nevada casino or being a ham radio operator in the state. This with a 125th anniversary of statehood plate enacted by the state legislature in recent days. As a result, Nevada drivers will soon be able to sport plates demonstrating their sponsorship of a clean up of the environment and at least one may say "I Support Ham Radio." ### FCC may refuse to prosecute beach ball jammers.

The FCC may not prosecute the two non hams who admitted to harassing an Amateur Radio repeater in Elkhart, Indiana by planting jamming devices. This is because the FCC says that Elkhart hams failed to file a formal complaint to the agency through the ARRL's Amateur Auxiliary.

According to Mike McCauley, KB9GNU the FCC did come to Elkhart and it did pick up all the evidence in the case. But the agency is now telling the ham radio community that Amateur Radio is self policing. The agency indicates that this combined its failure to file through the Amateur Auxiliary was an indication that hams had solved the problem on their own.

Chris Jellinek of the Chicago Field Operations Bureau says that her office is in receipt of a malicious interference complaint filed by the county sheriff. It names the man and a woman who admitted planting numerous jamming devices in Elkhart over the past year.

But McCauley says that the FCC is not telling the whole story. He tells Newsline that the hams involved in hunting down the jammers did attempt to contact the FCC. They did so on four different occasions, but never once did he or anyone else receive a reply.

McCauley says that they also contacted the Federal Bureau of Investigation twice and the American Radio Relay League three times and never received a reply.

McCauley was also critical of the attitude of the FCC inspector who did finally come to town. He says that there was supposed to be a meeting with the FCC's Robert Harness. The hams waited over three hours for him to show up. When he finally arrived, he would only meet with the Sheriff. The inspector snubbed the ham radio community and left without speaking with those waiting.

The FCC's Jellinek says her office is investigating the situation, but not as an ham radio related case. She also says that a letter of reprimand or similar minor sanction may be issued against the pair depending on the information that is uncovered. (Via Newsline #1050)
