#### Welcome To The Yavapai Amateur Radio Club

The Yavapai Amateur Radio Club (YARC) is an ARRL affiliated club. The club participates in many activities in the tri-city area by pro-viding communications for local events, emergency communications, and promotion of the hobby throughout the community. Membership in the YARC is open to any interested amateur or non-amateur alike. Dues are \$20.00/yr. The YARC meets at 7:00 PM local time on the first Thursday of every month at the Granite Mountain Middle School, 1800 Williamson Valley Rd. in Prescott. It is about 1/2 mile north of Iron Springs Rd and all amateurs and non-amateurs as well are invited. Programs of interest are included as part of the meeting. The weekly NET is held every Wednesday at 7:00 PM local time on the 146.880- repeater. All amateurs are invited to participate and visitors are always welcome. The Yavapai County ARES/RACES NET is held on Monday nights approximately at 6:45PM local time on the 147.220+ repeater on Mingus Mtn.

#### **Club Repeater**

The local 146.880- mHz repeater is the official adopted repeater for the YARC. It is located on the hill above Willow Creek Rd and requires a PL of 100.0 Hz. If you hear a 1400 Hz pulsing tone, the repeater is on backup battery power and usage should be limited to necessary communications. The 147.040+ (100.0 PL) repeater is back up and running in Prescott Heights. Many thanks to Bill Kafka, W2YAV for the upkeep and use of the repeaters.



#### From The Desk Of The President

YARC is off and running for 2005. One of the first orders of business for the club was the vote on the change to the bylaws. The members present at the January meeting voted overwhelmingly to approve of the changes. One of the major items in the new bylaws is the change in terms for club officers. In the past, officers served one-year terms. The new bylaws call for two-year terms,



with offices being staggered, i.e., two officers will be elected each year. This will provide continuity from one administration to the next. At the January board meeting, it was decided, should the bylaws changes be approved, that to transition to the new two-year paradigm, that the president and treasurer will serve a two-year term, 2005 - 2006, and the secretary and vice president will serve a one-year term. In November the election for officers and board members will be for a vice president and secretary and board members-at-large.

The annual post holiday party was held January 15<sup>th</sup> at the China Buffet. The turnout was good and a good time was had by all. I would like to thank Rex, N7NGM, for his efforts in securing prizes for the drawings. Thanks also to Bob, WB6ODR, for providing some prizes.

We currently have programs scheduled for the February, March and April meetings. I would like help from the club membership on finding program topic and speakers. Some of our members belong to other clubs. Many of these clubs might be of interest to YARC members. For instance, David, K6UWV, has arranged for the program in March to be given by a member of a Linux users group he belongs to. I would like members who belong to other clubs to see if their clubs would be interested in providing a program for YARC. I would also encourage members to offer suggestions on topics and/or speakers they'd like to have for a program.

We had an interesting visitor at the January meeting, Chuck Adams, K7QO. He advised attendees that, until just recently, he held the world Morse code speed record, 139 wpm, if I recall correctly. He passed out some CDs of his Morse code course. However, the most interesting thing about him is that he has volunteered to teach an amateur radio license class sponsored by YARC. There was some discussion about the club sponsoring a class at the meeting. (see President, page 3)

#### Minutes of January 6, 2005 Meeting



John, WB9VGJ called the meeting to order at 1900. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Visitorsattending the meeting: John Markham and Chuck

Adams, K7QO. New Member joining the club: Richard Strick, N9CEX. Other visitors and members present, introduced themselves.

Meeting Minutes: Since the Newsletters, containing minutes for November and December had not yet been published, Terry, KB7TRE made a motion to postpone approval of November's minutes until February's meeting, and was seconded by Al, KD7MTJ. Terry also made a motion to postpone approval of December's minutes; seconded by Lloyd, WA6ZZJ. Both were approved.

*Treasurer's Report:* Dave, K6UWV gave the treasurer's report.

Committee Reports: Lloyd, WA6ZZJ discussed ARES/RACES activation over the past weeks to assist in any emergency operations. He indicated further activation may be possible this weekend. Monitor frequencies are 147.22 and 147.26.

*Old Business:* Club patches are now available for \$3.00; they can be ironed on.

Ballots were collected from eligible members present, to approve or disapprove the proposed changes to the YARC Bylaws. Terry, KB7TRE volunteered to count the ballots. The proposed Bylaws were accepted: 18 Yes votes; 1 No vote.

Rex, N7NGM is getting prizes for the January 15<sup>th</sup> dinner party at the China Buffet, and needs volunteers to collect the prizes.

John, WB9VGJ indicated that the Newsletter would be ready in a few days – that Hal, N6OVE will try to publish the Newsletter prior to meetings.

*New Business:* Joe, AC6AA discussed the ARRL Club Commission Membership Program and suggested that the club

participate. The club would retain \$15.00 for each new membership processed, and \$2.00 for each renewal. A New Member is defined as an individual who has never been a member of ARRL, or anyone not a member for two or more calendar years prior to application. Jim, N5RO made a motion to approve, seconded by Lloyd, WA6ZZJ. The motion carried.

Joe also indicated that a copy of the YARC Roster would be printed and mailed in January of each year to those members without email access to the YARC website

John, WB9VGJ posted an article on the emergency operations that took place on Andaman Island, which showed the need for Amateur Radio.

John presented a Certificate of Appreciation to outgoing president Rex, N7NGM, and to treasurer Al, KD7MTJ.

Rex, N7NGM said that he met with Jack, W7JLC to discuss possible club interest in sponsoring an unmanned balloon flight.

In accordance with the approved bylaws, John, WB9VGJ announced that the board has decided he and Dave, K6UWV will serve a term of two years, and Bob, WB7RRQ and Joe, AC6AA will serve a one year term.

Terry, KB7TRE indicated that Granite Mountain Middle School held their first ham club meeting for the year, with 5 boys attending. Also, on February 14<sup>th</sup>, their club will set up a station at Charlotte Hall. Our club to supply pizza for the kids.

John, WB9VGJ asked if anyone was interested in working with VVRA on Field Day. He also requested that anyone interested in operating Slow/Fast Scan for ARES, contact Lloyd. WA6ZZJ or John, WB9VGJ.

John Markham mentioned that ARRL has a 30 second public service announcement, available for downloading on their website as a WAVE or MP3 file. "Ham Radio works when other communications don't', is its central message. Also, he indicated that Embry Riddle University has a new office building that will open Wednesday, January 12th at 3:30 p.m. At 5:00 p.m. a weather balloon will be launched.

Jack, W7JLC will be giving the February program on ADS-B, APRS for airplanes. Asked for help from club members for programs.

John, WB9VGJ mentioned that W6QV, a Scottsdale realtor, requested that he be contacted if anyone knows of a Ham radio QTH in Prescott that is available, complete with antenna, etc.

It was suggested that Dale, N7XFD receive a certificate of appreciation for his past services to the club. A motion was made by David, K6UWV and seconded by Lloyd, WA6ZZJ, for approval of a framed certificate. Motion carried, and John, WB9VGJ will obtain a framed certificate to present to Dale.

There was discussion on the Club establishing Ham Radio classes and VE sessions. Several places for classes were suggested, including the Jeep Posse house at Pioneer Park. John, WB9VGJ will get an article in the Newsletter, to see if there is interest in getting VE's and someone to run classes.

John asked for a volunteer to run the Wednesday night 2 meter net. With no volunteers, John said he will do it for next Wednesday.

It was noted that Jack, W7JLC has a Collins 30L1 for sale for \$550.00.

The meeting adjourned at 1950 on a motion by Tom, W2JKG; seconded by Terry, KB7TRE.
Minutes of January, 2005 Board Meeting

A board meeting was held January 6, 2005. Present were John, WB9VGJ; Bob, WB7RRQ; Joe, AC6AA; Dave, K6UWV; Jack, W3IVQ; Terry, KB7TRE; Walter, KF6SPS and Rex, N7NGM.

John called the meeting to order at 1813. John asked for approval to purchase a copy of Robert's Rules of Order – the Board approved.

To accommodate Article IV of the proposed bylaws, i.e., terms of officers shall be staggered, with two officers being elected each year, the Board agreed that John, WB9VGJ and Dave, K6UWV serve for two years; Joe, AC6AA and Bob, WB7RRQ serve for one year.

A discussion was held on sources of programs for meetings. Board members were asked to seek out suitable programs, and members also will be asked to assist as well.

Joe, AC6AA brought up the following items for Board approval:

- 1) A recommendation that the club participate in the ARRL Club Commission Membership Recruitment Program, which would entitle the Club to receive \$2.00 for each ARRL membership renewal and \$15.00 for each new ARRL membership.
- 2) An additional entry on the YARC Membership Application to indicate if an applicant is an ARRL member.
- 3) Printing a hard copy of the Club Roster for those members not having an email copy available. The Board suggested that the Secretary have copies printed each January for mailing.
- 4) A suggestion that the Secretary send a meeting reminder notice each month to members receiving email, which also would include the program to be presented, when available.

The Board approved all the above items.

John, WB9VGJ discussed the items to be covered at the general membership meeting. He also recommended that Board meetings be held at 1830, at Granite Mountain Middle School, prior to the regular general meeting. The members agreed.

# December 29, 2004 Weather Emergency...



At 0930 on December 29, 2004 Yavapai County ARES/ RACES was activated due to weather related emergencies in the Prescott, Sedona, Cottonwood and

Black Canyon City areas. Evacuations were taking place in all of these areas and the County Emergency Plan calls for ARES/RACES to be activated any time the Yavapai County Emergency Operating Center is in operation.

Operators were positioned at the Yavapai County EOC, Prescott EOC, Sedona EOC and Black Canyon City EOC. Operations consisted of establishing communications between EOC's in case regular communications became inoperable or overloaded and also monitoring the public service frequencies to keep the EOC updated. Reports of stream levels and rainfall amounts were also called in by amateurs in some of the affected areas.

ARES/RACES members actively involved in the operation were Prescott EC/Asst. RO-KC7CBK, Verde Valley EC/Asst. RO-N6BDC, AA7OV in Black Canyon City, AEC-KD6LZE in Sedona, W7JLC in Prescott and Yavapai County DEC/RO WA6ZZJ. Communications were also conducted with KL7DU with the Red Cross in the Verde Valley. Message traffic consisted mostly of tactical reports and updates throughout the day. The operation was released to a 'standby status' at 1830 hours on the 29th and terminated at 0900 hours on the 30th when the stream levels had started to subside.

The VVARA Mingus Mountain 147.220 Mhz repeater was used for most of the event related traffic.

#### Red Cross Communications....

On Monday, January 3, 2005 the Red Cross called for backup communications assistance from the Prescott Headquarters to their Family Assistance Operation at the Verde Valley Fire Station in Cottonwood. Operations in Cottonwood were handled by Mel Boreham, N6BDC and ED (President, from front page) It looks like it is a real possibility. In addition to K7OO's desire to teach a class, we have been offered the use of the Jeep Posse's facility, free of charge, for holding the classes. Terry, KB7TRE, said he could also provide facilities. Another visitor, John Markham, who will be giving the March program, who works for Wolfsberg Electronics, is not only interested in getting his amateur license (and perhaps some other employees there), he advised that his company may be able to provide facilities and possibly some funds for an amateur radio class. I think this is a good opportunity for the club. Chuck has volunteered to handle the class all by himself. However, as there are several logistical issues involved and a bit of work to conduct a class, I'd like at least one volunteer to help Chuck with the class. If anyone is interested in helping with a license class, please contact me.


