

## From the Desk of the President

The amateur license classes conducted by Chuck, K7QO, turned out to be a real success. One person took the code test and passed on Friday, April 29<sup>th</sup>. On Saturday, April 30<sup>th</sup>, 17 applicants tested taking 18 elements. As a result, there are now 11 new Technicians, one new Technician w/HF, three Generals and one Extra. Out of 18 elements given there were only two that were not passed. One of the Generals was grandfathered in.

Many Thanks to Chuck for teaching the class, Mary AB7NK, for spearheading the VEC session, all the VEs who helped with the testing, Jim, N5RO for assisting Chuck with administrative duties, Jimmy, KD7RMV, for securing the Yavapai County Sheriff's Posse facility for the classroom, and anyone else who was involved with the effort.

Chuck advised at the meeting that he'd like to give two class sessions a year, with the next two being held this September and in January 2006. He already has two or three potential students for a class. As we can all remember, getting our amateur radio license was a great accomplishment, but the thought of getting on the air and making an actual contact was somewhat intimidating. Chuck has requested that the club assist the new licensees by establishing a net to allow them to get on the air and practice. Any club member interested in participating in a net to help the new hams can contact me. Also, I'd like to have a few volunteers to serve on an Elmer committee. The purpose would be to be available to provide help and advice to the new hams. As it appears we will be having new licensees from upcoming classes, I believe such a committee would be useful. The members would serve as first contacts for question the new hams would have regarding equipment, operating, etc. Anyone



interested in doing this can contact me.

I am hopeful that these amateur license classes will help spread our great hobby to new folks and fill a need here in the Tri-City area for those wishing to become licensed. I think it is a positive thing for the club. In addition to helping the hobby grow, it can help the club grow and remain a vital entity.

## Welcome To The Yavapai Amateur Radio Club

The Yavapai Amateur Radio Club (YARC) is an ARRL affiliated club. The club participates in many activities in the tri-city area by providing communications for local events, emergency communications, and promotion of the hobby throughout the community. Membership in the YARC is open to any interested amateur or non-amateur alike. Dues are \$20.00/yr. The YARC meets at 7:00 PM local time on the first Thursday of every month at the Granite Mountain Middle School, 1800 Williamson Valley Rd. in Prescott. It is about 1/2 mile north of Iron Springs Rd and all amateurs and non-amateurs as well are invited. Programs of interest are included as part of the meeting. The weekly NET is held every Wednesday at 7:00 PM local time on the 146.880- repeater. All amateurs are invited to participate and visitors are always welcome. ## Club Repeater

The local 146.880- mHz repeater is the official adopted repeater for the YARC. It is located on the hill above Willow Creek Rd and requires a PL of 100.0 Hz. If you hear a 1400 Hz pulsing tone, the repeater is on backup battery power and usage should be limited to necessary communications. *Minutes of May 5, 2005 General Meeting*



John, WB9VGJ called the meeting to order at 1900. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited, and members introduced themselves.

Visitors: Dale Leslie, N7XFD; Lois Diddams and Vi Hughes, XYL's.

**New Members:** Several new members were approved this month by a voice vote: Pat, KE7DUC; Chuck, K7QO; Rose, KE7DTY; Dick, KE7DTX and Richard Bozeat.

**New Licensees:** Pat, KE7DUC; Rose, KE7DTY and Dick, KE7DTX.

**Meeting Minutes:** A motion to approve March Minutes was made by Bob, WB7RRQ and seconded by Hal, N6OVE. The motion carried. A motion to approve April Minutes was made by Terry, KB7TRE and seconded by Lloyd, WA6ZZJ. The motion carried.

**Treasurer's Report:** Dave, W6UWV reported a balance of \$1389.89. The report was approved on a motion by Doug, KV8TD and seconded by Terry, KB7TRE.

**Committee Reports:**

**Ares/Races/Public Service:** Lloyd, WA6ZZJ reported on the 27<sup>th</sup> annual Whiskey Row Marathon. Fourteen club members and two ARES/RACES members provided essential communications for this event. The marathon is an opportunity for Y.A.R.C. to provide a major public service.

The next ARES/RACES training session will be held on Saturday, May 21 in Cottonwood. Lloyd also indicated that it is the last two months to sign up for the ARRL Emergency Communication Level 1 course.

**Newsletter:** Hal, N6OVE encouraged members to e-mail him pictures taken at events such as the marathon, and also to include commentaries with the pictures.

**Badges:** Bob, WB6ODR indicated cost of

badges was \$5.60 and he was accepting orders.

**License Class:** Chuck, K7QO reported that twenty persons passed his course: 15 technicians, 1 technician plus, 3 generals, and 1 extra class. There was a 89.9% pass ratio for the written exam. Chuck plans to teach classes twice a year. There will be a 9 week, 3 hour class in the middle of September and another in January. He emphasized the need for making sure the new licensees had a rig to operate, and that they get help on-the-air from other hams. Chuck is taking signups for his next class, and encouraged everyone to recruit new students.

John, WB9VGJ presented Chuck with a Certificate of Appreciation and a one year club membership. He also will present Mary, AB7NK a Certificate for her effort in coordinating the VE testing.

**Echolink/IRLP:** Jack, W7JLC is working to develop IRLP, since Echolink is now available to most hams. He discussed equipment requirements. \$150 will be needed to fund the project. Lloyd, WA6ZZJ reported that \$511.20 was given to Lee Roger's widow from the sale of her husband's equipment. She in turn donated \$100 to our club, which Lloyd suggested be applied to the IRLP repeater fund. Terry, KB7TRE made a motion that the \$100 be designated for IRLP and Dave, K6UWV seconded. The motion carried. KV8TD made a motion that an additional \$50 be contributed by the club for IRLP, which was seconded by Terry, KB7TRE. The motion carried.

**Old Business:**

**Wednesday Night Net:** John passed around a signup sheet to obtain additional net controls needed for the rest of this year. He encouraged more participation in the weekly Y.A.R.C. Net.

**Brochures:** Jim, N5RO passed around a draft of a revised club brochure, and asked for comments or suggestions.

**New Business:**

Jack, W7JLC reported that a new ham satellite has been launched. Also, Embry Riddle University wants to set up a ham radio satellite station at their school. Jack asked for volunteers to assist in the installation. He reported on a balloon launch last Saturday from Gila Bend.

Ham Radio played a major part in the support of the successful launch, flight, and recovery.

**Announcements:** John, WB9VGJ described the programs for the next few months. Tonight, Radio Controlled Airplanes; June, FCC Direction Finding Equipment; July, Hang Gliding and August, Club Newsletter.

**anchors:** Several items were offered for sale by members present.

A motion to adjourn the business portion of the meeting at 1945 was made by Terry, KB7TRE and seconded by Tom, W2JKG. The motion carried and there was a break for refreshments.

**Drawing:** Terry, KB7TRE won \$17 in the 50/50 drawing.

**Program:** Ray, K6CMU passed around examples of engines and other parts used in radio controlled airplanes. He discussed the history of radio controlled airplanes and the previous requirement that ham licenses were necessary to operate the planes.



He also pointed out the similarities between ham radio and radio controlled airplane hobbies. Ray described the various types and sizes of aircraft flown, and showed a video of several large planes, of different construction, taking off, flying and landing.

The program ended at 2050.

The 27<sup>th</sup> annual Whiskey Row Marathon is history and the Yavapai Amateur Radio Club once again did a stellar job of providing communications for the event. On Saturday, April 30<sup>th</sup>, fourteen YARC and two ARES/RACES members were out in the wee hours of the morning to set up and provide the communications.


Communications were once again provided from each of the eight water stations along with a shadow operator, a quad mobile, a portable in the YMCA van and Net Control.

Tactical message traffic consisted of keeping all stations supplies up and if necessary arranging for water and fruit to be moved among the water stations. Keeping tracking of the lead runners along with knowing the position of the ambulance on the race course was also handled. This year was a much busier year than past Marathons with radio traffic keeping a steady pace throughout the duration of the race. There were a couple of runners that had to be transported and the ambulance was called to the finish line to check out a two of the runners.

There was a total of 1,470 participants in the Full Marathon, One Half Marathon, 10K Run, 10K Walk and 2 mile Fun Run. The full Marathon had a total of 175 runners.

Once again, the YMCA race director said that they ‘couldn’t do it without us’..... As last year, the YARC logo was once again on the Marathon t-shirts along with the other major race sponsors.

A big THANK YOU to the amateurs participating. This is our biggest public service event of the year next to the Road Rally in October. All of the amateurs participating should ‘talk it up’ with the members who didn’t and get more people out next year. Public service communications can be fun along with keeping up the tradition of Amateur Radio.



## The K7QO Code Course

Chuck Adams, K7QO has developed a Morse code course that starts an individual from the ground floor of not knowing the Morse code and gets them to 20wpm. This course is on one CD and uses audio files in MP3 format so that over 12.5 hours of audio can be used to learn and practice the sounds that make up Morse code. You can listen to these MP3 files on your computer. If you want to use the CD away from your computer, a basic CD-style MP3 player with headphones can be purchased at your local electronic store for about \$25.

One aspect of this course that I particularly like is geared toward instant recognition. People who know the code but are “stuck” and cannot increase their speed proficiency may use this CD to test themselves for instant recognition. If you hear a character but cannot IMMEDIATELY identify it, you do not have instant recognition of that character and it is holding you back being able to copy faster speeds. It may surprise you that hesitating on just a handful of letters or numbers can impede your progress, but it does. After assessing your problem areas --- the specific characters that you do not instantly recognize – you can use Chuck’s code program to concentrate on just those letters or numbers. It can also help those who learned the code incorrectly and are at a plateau because they are mentally translating from short-cut methods or visual aids.

This course teaches you to use only the sounds that you hear to translate to characters as rapidly as possible. Of course, it takes a commitment of time and repetition to learn or re-learn the code correctly. As you’ve heard me say before, there is no magic pill or shortcut to code proficiency. Just like anything else worth having, you have to do the work.

The letters in the code course are introduced in alphabetical order in the same way that the alphabet is taught to everyone at home and school. In this manner, the bad habit of counting individual dots and/or dashes is avoided, which is inherently embedded in teaching Morse code by starting with E,I,S,H, and 5. By starting with A, B, C, etc.,

the student hopefully avoids the habit of disassembling the individual sounds in order to decode individual characters. Bad habits, like counting or word association, will keep anyone from ever getting to higher speeds. Because the disc is in MP3 format with high quality audio, a large amount of practice material is available on the CD. The disc contains files to learn the individual letters, numerals, prosigns, and punctuation. Test files are given after the introduction of every two characters to aid in retention and practice. Approximately 12.5 hours for the introductory course is on the CD, plus another 10 hours for helping get character recognition of individual characters to 30wpm and higher. Also a number of sample QSOs are given to aid operators in what they will typically hear on the air. A large number of plain text files are included to practice on and so you will not get bored with the same thing over and over. With this much audio material it is practically impossible for anyone to memorize the text (even Chuck, K7QO, doesn’t have it memorized).

The ARRL discontinued their CDs and tapes beyond the introductory 5wpm set, so this course includes everything that used to be in six CDs from the ARRL for a total cost of about \$45 to \$50. Included on the disc is an instruction manual in PDF format that may be printed out and used to learn the code. Also, two articles I wrote about instant recognition are included on the disc in PDF format. Chuck has also included his article on sending with an iambic paddle. Chuck has been using CW almost exclusively for almost 50 years. He has CP-60 for 60wpm from the ARRL for the Samuel F.B. Morse Bicentennial Code Proficiency Award in 1992 and has 109wpm and the highest code speed in his age group for RUFZ, a program used for high speed code competition at a lot of contest conventions, especially in Europe. Yes, you read that right: 60wpm code proficiency from the ARRL and 109wpm on RUFZ!

And the most important point of all is that the code course is free. It will be available at the FISTS booth at Dayton FREE. For those not going to Dayton you can download the course in ISO format from K7QO’s website. Do a Google to find it easily. And if you happen to not have Internet access or can’t download

140MB files easily, you can send a return mailer with postage to FISTS, P.O. Box 47, Hadley, MI 48440 and we will send a copy to you. You can also send Chuck a blank CD with a return mailer and he will be more than happy to make a copy for you. No charge.

Working on a goal with a friend is more fun than going it alone, so I am in the process of starting an email reflector/chat group for users of the code course. That way, you can join the group and exchange tips and suggestions, and we can send out encouraging emails and see how you’re doing. I’ll have more information about that after the details are worked out. FISTS (and Chuck, who is a member FISTS) is trying to make it as easy as possible for you to obtain and use the disk. Chuck has developed this course and does not charge for it. He did it just to help others learn a mode that is really a joy to use when you are proficient with it. Chuck, K7QO says, “With the investment of about 15-30 minutes every day from your hectic schedule you can begin your journey to become an accomplished CW operator”. As W3CVE used to say, “High speed code operators are not born. They are trained.” Make it a point to increase your code speed by at least 5wpm per year until you get to speeds that your friends can’t copy! And get on the air and demonstrate your skills to others so that they, too, will get on the bandwagon.
